petitioners for a highway from William Harroy to Rowley Line for
convenience of the Country at Mulliken. Do by these present give grant
unto y^e Lord of Bradford or their Assignes as there Agents, a way thro
our Lands for y^e good and benefit of y^e publick and private for their
use and benefit for ever as it is hereafter bounded viz
As the way now lies from William Harroy by Thomas Merril to Joseph
Harroy and so on the Road now goes to John Harroy and so as the Road
now goes to the Cashey and so over this Cashey as it now lies. then by way
the Eastwardly side of a Black oak tree marked being on the East side
of two white oak marked then running by a black oak marked so on the East
side of a black oak marked near Hugh Smiths now Dwelling house
then running at the Road now goes till it comes to an old way then
running between two meadows belonging to Francis Harroy so on the East
side of a litle hill so to Rowley Line Southing to y^e East of a litle
meadow Except that the proprietors Reserve to themselves the wood in
the meadow now growing on said way To Have and to Hold the above descibed
Lands and on the way for the Inhabitants off this town and all other
travellers what soever to use occupy possess and Enjoy for ever more with out
or bars force and clear of all charges or demands for any pay for the lands
this town of Bradford nor else whome so ever they shall whereof we and each
of us have had unto set our hands this Twenty third day of March
the first of 1738-9 and the way above descibed as the above now done
to be two Rods wide in each and every part thereof thro out
